### **Good Progress Towards 2020 Vision**

One Nottingham's Annual Report 2011/12 shows that despite the difficult economic climate, significant success has been achieved in the second year of the Nottingham Plan to 2020.

Achievements include:

# A strong focus on supporting economic growth, including:

- Developing The Nottingham Growth Plan, to help drive Nottingham's economy forward
- Starting work on Phase Two of the tram network connecting south west Nottingham to the city centre
- Establishing the Employer Hub, which has secured over 600 job and apprenticeship opportunities for local people

Helping young people into sustainable employment through the £1.5m Nottingham lobs Fund.

# Cohesive communities with locally delivered services:

• Increasing citizen satisfaction with their neighbourhoods

Creating new neighbourhood structures to help the City Council, Nottinghamshire Police and other partners work better together to tackle local issues.

# Continued improvement in education levels:

- Improving attainment once again in English and Maths at age 11
- Celebrating the best GCSE results ever in the city

Achieving the lowest levels of young people not in education, employment or training (NEET) among other similar cities

# Nottingham is cleaner, safer and greener:

- Falling crime taking levels to their lowest since the 1980s
- Citizen satisfaction with the way in which the Council and Police tackle crime and anti-social behaviour increasing to an all time high
- Carbon emissions falling to the lowest among the Core Cities.

Chair of One Nottingham, Councillor David Mellen, said: "We have seen some significant achievements over the last year, despite the difficult economic conditions, thanks to strong collaborative working with our partners and citizens. We and our partners remain ambitious for Nottingham and while progress is encouraging, we recognise the scale of the challenge ahead and are still focused on stimulating economic growth and breaking the cycle of poverty."

Key priorities for the partnership are:

- \* Supporting our most vulnerable people
- \* Stimulating economic growth and prioritising local jobs for local people
- \* Intervening early to prevent difficulties and problems arising later
- \* Providing visible services in neighbourhoods
- \* Ensuring local people are able to enjoy themselves in Nottingham.

### **Partners Comments**

All One Nottingham partners have met and reaffirmed their commitment to The Nottingham Plan to 2020, which is a ten-year plan, setting out a vision of what Nottingham should look like in the future, following extensive consultation with Nottingham citizens. One Nottingham partner agencies give their views on progress made against the Nottingham Plan targets:

### **Nottingham City Council**

Leader of Nottingham City Council, Councillor Jon Collins, said: "I am proud of the progress and success achieved with our partners over the last year. The development of the Nottingham Growth Plan will help to strengthen Nottingham's economy through a range of projects linked to enterprise, workforce and infrastructure – providing opportunities for local people and local businesses.

"I am particularly pleased to see crime and anti-social behaviour continue to fall significantly, which makes such a difference to the quality of life for people in our communities."

### **Nottinghamshire Police**

Nottinghamshire Police Divisional Commander, Ch Supt Simon Nickless, said: "2011 saw the lowest levels of crime within Nottingham City for 30 years. We have worked in partnership to provide a safer environment for all those to live, work and visit the city.

"The perceptions around anti social behaviour in the citizen surveys are at

an all time low with just 9% of citizens highlighting ASB as an issue. Notting-hamshire Police will continue to work in partnership to ensure that Notting-ham is a significantly safer city with lower levels of crime, fear of crime and perceptions of ASB.

"The work around offender management, drug intervention and victim care illustrate the partnership commitment to tackling the causes of crime and intervening earlier in the lives of those at risk. Nottinghamshire Police will continue to support One Nottingham in the delivery of the Nottingham Plan 2020 and the commitment towards a safer Nottingham."

### **NHS Nottingham City**

Ron Buchanan, Chair of NHS Notting-ham City said: "Collaborative working with a number of cross-sector partners has resulted in some tangible improvements in the health of our population. Levels of smoking continue to decrease, as have premature deaths from cardio-vascular disease. Through the provision of personal health budgets we have been able to offer more flexibility to patients who need long-term support, giving them a real say in how, when and where their care is delivered. We

look forward to working with our One Nottingham partners over the coming years as we continue to tackle the health challenges impacting on our local population and work towards further increasing life expectancy and reducing health inequalities in Nottingham City."

### **Nottingham City Homes**

Nottingham City Homes Chief Executive, Nick Murphy, said: "Our investment in housing is bringing wider benefits than just modernising homes. We've been able to help bring down burglary rates through securer

homes, improve Nottingham's neighbourhoods, provide a boost to the local economy by providing jobs and apprenticeships and also give people a better quality of life. # East Midlands Communities for Health Network Is it possible to have good health in hard times?

Communities for Health
in the East Midlands

The East Midlands Communities for Health Network has held 10 major health and wellbeing learning events since it's inception in 2010 that have been attended by almost 2,000 people from all sectors across the East Midlands

In September, the network organised a one-day conference – 'Is it possible to have good health in hard times?' held at Trent Vineyard in Nottingham. Approximately 300 individuals, from local authorities and partner organisations, attended the conference which was focussed on examining how economic austerity might impact on the social determinants of health and affect physical and mental health. In addition to presentations from national and regional experts, best practice was showcased during the day to help bring to life the issues and support the develop-

ment of policies and programmes across health and the wider determinants of health.

A number of presentations were made including **Professor Danny Dorling** from the University of Sheffield, who gave an inspiring and thought provoking presentation on 'Economic austerity, rising inequality and the social determinants of health', bringing the debate on inequalities, income, education and social immobility to life. Further information on this work can be found at www.dannydorling.org.

**Emily Roberts**, Children's Services Manager at Barnardo's, delivered the presentation 'Growing up poor: the impact of poverty on children's health and life chances'. This highlighted the challenge of meeting the 2020 child poverty targets when almost a third of

all children in the UK are now living in poverty (after housing costs). **Mick McGrath**, Head of the East Midlands Big Lottery Fund went on to give an overview of the current funding streams and projects that were focussing on health and wellheing.

**Dr Mike Grady**, Senior Researcher with the **Institute of Health Equity** (Marmot), delivered a stimulating and insightful presentation entitled 'Health Inequities and Resilience in Tough Times'. He emphasised that people needed to have a stake in their communities and once empowered, their self esteem will improve and they will be able to take control.

The key messages that delegates were taking back included:

- \* Community building and engagement
- \* Focus on collaborative and partnership working
- \* Intervene early, preferably before birth
- \* Invest in short term for long term benefits

# Local Investment Plan for ERDF in Nottingham

Between 2007-13 Nottingham has been allocated around £18 million under the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) Priority Axis 2.

A Local Investment Plan has been developed to focus ERDF Priority Axis 2 (PA2) on eligible activities that will make a difference to economic activity in the city. This particularly focuses on:

- Support to develop space for businesses, in identified growth sectors, to start up and grow
- Improved ICT connectivity to

develop economic opportunities in disadvantaged areas of the city

- Support for new and growing businesses in the local economy
- Improvements to the physical environment in key local areas in order to attract further investment.

£10 million has already been directed to projects such as the regeneration of the Sneinton Market area; advice and support to people to set up their own businesses; improved premises for small businesses to establish themselves and grow in a supportive environment; and improved connectivity for some key business hubs.



The European Team at Nottingham City Council is currently seeking outline applications from projects which can particularly support the aims of the Nottingham Growth Plan.

# **Big Changes to Council Tax Benefit - Consultation**

Nottingham City Council has launched its consultation into how people will receive Council Tax support after Central Government end the current National Council Tax Benefit system in April 2013.

From April 2013, the Government is ending the national Council Tax Benefit scheme and will no longer set all the rules for who can claim and qualify for help with their Council Tax. Instead, councils are expected to create their own Council Tax Support Schemes.

Before councils take over this responsibility, the Government is reducing the amount of money it makes available to them for this purpose. In Nottingham, this could mean there will be £6 million less next year and around £7 million less the following year - meaning an average Nottingham household which would previously receive Council Tax Benefit could lose around £20 a month.

And because there will be no change in

the amount of benefit low income pensioners receive, all other recipients - around 26,500 households - could see an average cut in their Council Tax Benefit of as much as 20%.

Earlier engagement with citizens helped Nottingham City Council to shape its proposals for a draft Council Tax Support Scheme. The City Council has also worked with the city councils of Derby and Leicester and as a result all three cities, which face similar issues in addressing the new responsibilities, have developed the same proposals.

Nottingham City Council is now seeking views on the proposed scheme, with a formal consultation up and running until 30 October 2012. The main proposals are:

• Low income pensioners will not be affected by the changes but it's anticipated that everyone else who currently receives Council Tax Benefit will have to pay something towards their Council Tax from April 2013

- A maximum limit will be placed on the amount of Council Tax support that can be paid to all working age people
- The eligibility criteria for all working age people will be adjusted.

Your organisation may wish to comment on the proposals and/or support citizens of Nottingham with their feedback during this consultation period.

### It's Official, Nottingham Rocks

Recently described on BBC Radio 2 as "the capital of music," Nottingham's music scene is gathering momentum and hosting its first FREE festival of new music on October 28 to showcase local talent.

The past couple of years have seen Nottingham's Jake Bugg, Natalie Duncan and Dog is Dead breakthrough, supporting world-class artists, playing at major festivals, releasing singles and albums, and getting airplay on BBC Radio One, Radio 2 and 6music and Later Live... with Jools Holland. This national airplay is, in part, thanks to BBC Introducing - a strand dedicated entirely to under the radar music on BBC Radio Nottingham's The Beat with Dean Jackson.

Branch Out festival has been created to showcase the next wave of talent on the verge of breaking through into the national spotlight. The event is being organised by a partnership of city promoters, labels and managers, including

Denizen Recordings, Farmyard Records, Hello Thor, DHP Concerts, Nusic, I'm Not From London, Confetti, LeftLion, CRS, One Nottingham and Nottingham City Council.

Mark Del heads non-profit voluntary organisation Nusic (meaning Nottingham New Music). He has long lobbied for a Nottingham number one and has given countless Nottingham artists their first media exposure and support. He said: "October is the month Nottingham steps it up, the biggest month for our scene this millennium! Top 40 albums from Dog Is Dead and Jake Bugg (who I think can go all the way to number one) plus maybe Natalie Duncan too (post nailing it on Jools Holland) will be 'the rising tide that lifts all ships'.

They'll lead the way for a tsunami of Notts talent to breakthrough and firmly establish Nottingham as home to the most vibrant music scene in the UK. Now, you've had a taste of our local talent, Branch



Out is your opportunity to hear the next wave of phenomenal talent from our great city."

The music festival is part of the month-long Festival of Nottingham to bring together the best of the city's arts, music and gaming talent and celebrate all the city has to offer. It includes GameCity, Europe's biggest and best-loved videogame culture festival.

# **Funding Hits the Right Note for City's Young Musicians**

Nottingham's Music Service has secured over £1.6 million to create a Music Education Hub for Nottingham.

Councillor David Mellen, the Chair of the One Nottingham Board, said: "It's fantastic news that Nottingham has secured this funding; it will ensure we continue to uphold our strong reputation for musical education in the city. I'm a strong believer in the benefits music can bring to people of all ages but its extremely rewarding to see young people gaining new skills and confidence because of their involvement with the Music Service."

The Nottingham Music Education Hub

is a continuation of the Nottingham music service but in a new form. It is grant-funded by the Arts Council and will continue to provide a universal music education service to all children and young people in Nottingham City and will seek ways to develop greater understanding of progression and career routes in the music industry.

The Music School, which has moved to a new home at the Nottingham Academy in Greenwood Road, Bakersfield, is currently looking for more students from eight to 19 ages and of all abilities for their Concert, Intermediate and Training Orchestras, and their World Music group. Those wanting to play

rock, pop or indie music can join the Band Factory from the age of 11 - 19 and receive guidance from professional musicians who've worked with members of The Prodigy and the Stranglers.

November 2012. Each police force area in England and Wales has local transition arrangements in place managed through the outgoing Police Authorities.
